



6. List of secured and pending donors with specific amounts donated for this program. Also include a list of donors to your organization's other programs or annual support within the past twelve months, including the specific amounts donated (only include corporate and foundation donations \$1,000 and above) - please include on a separate sheet.
7. Percent of organization's total grant money received that comes from the government, and the percent of organization's operating budget that is spent on fund-raising and administration.
8. Organization's Current Operating Budget showing revenue sources and expenses - please include on a separate sheet.
9. Most recent year-to-date financial statements (balance sheet or statement of activities and functional expenses).
10. Copy of organization's most recent audit.
11. Officers and Board Members with affiliations - please include on a separate sheet.
12. Statement that the organization has tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that a contribution to it is tax deductible.

Style

Proposals should be prepared in a concise, narrative form, without extensive documentation.

Deadline

There is no formal deadline. Proposals are accepted and reviewed on a rolling basis.

Additional Documentation

Each grant request must be submitted with current documentation verifying the organization's eligibility under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). Proposals from organizations with a pending status will not be reviewed.

Organizations may not submit the same or similar proposals more than once in a Foundation fiscal year (July 1 – June 30).

Organizations invited to submit a formal grant proposal will be contacted within 4-6 weeks following their online submission of a Letter of Inquiry.

Therefore, we use a two-step process to identify organizations that best align with our funding guidelines and criteria. Any organization interested in receiving a grant must complete an eligibility survey and submit a letter of interest. Only those most qualified will be invited to submit a full application for funding.*

Paper applications are no longer accepted by the ConAgra Foods Foundation. All letters of interest and applications must be received through the online grant application process. In addition, the Foundation will not accept or review unsolicited applications received in hard-copy or outside the pre-determined timelines established for each grant program.

The ConAgra Foods Foundation awards grants to qualified charitable organizations in three funding categories: National Strategic Partnerships, Community Impact Grants (currently under development) and an employee-driven grant making program, Nourish Our Community Grants.

As part of an organization's funding application, the following materials will either be requested in the application itself or be a required attachment:

- A list of key project staff members including short biographies and roles and responsibilities. Please do not send resumes.
- A brief bio of senior staff members (e.g. executive director).
- A list of current organization board members, including their affiliations.
- A copy of your organization's most recent audited financial statements.
- A copy of your organization's operational budget for the grant year.

The ConAgra Foods Foundation evaluates all potential partners using the following set of criteria. Organizations or programs must:

- Have a wide and diverse reach across lines of age, gender, ethnicity, and/or geography.
- Provide programs or projects that align with ConAgra's funding priorities of child hunger and nutrition.
- Possess a detailed and clear strategy for achieving stated program goals.
- Demonstrate alignment with research-based nutrition frameworks or guidelines such as the United States Department of Agriculture's Dietary Guidelines and MyPyramid.
- Be a leader in its field and the community.
- Have strong leadership and an active board.
- Seek to partner or collaborate with other service providers to enhance service offerings and minimize duplication.
- Offer opportunities for ConAgra's key stakeholders — employees, executives, consumers, and customers — to get involved.
- Have a proven track record of working with corporate funders.
- Track and measure impact and actively use the information to refine and enhance the organization's programs or projects.
- Be fiscally strong and have a stable and diverse funding base.

If so, you may be asked to submit one copy of your application following the foundation's format. Submit well before the funds would be needed. Grants are reviewed quarterly, in February, May,

September, and December. The application deadlines for those meetings are January 15, April 1, August 1, and October 1.

Purpose and Activities: Cottonwood Foundation, a charitable, tax-exempt, 501(c)(3) organization, is dedicated to promoting empowerment of people, protection of the environment, and respect for cultural diversity. The foundation focuses its funding on committed grassroots organizations that rely strongly on volunteer efforts, and where foundation support will make a significant difference. At least 90% of Cottonwood Foundation's expenditures are for grants to other organizations.

Application Information: Cottonwood Foundation has a very limited amount of funding available, and will only award grants to organizations that meet **all four** of the following criteria:

1. protect the **environment**
2. promote cultural **diversity**
3. **empower** people to meet their basic needs
4. rely on **volunteer** efforts

Organizations that do not meet all four criteria, are not eligible for funding by Cottonwood Foundation. Cottonwood Foundation especially seeks to support organizations for which small grants will make a significant difference. U.S. and international organizations are eligible for funding by Cottonwood Foundation. While organizations are not required to have 501(c)(3) status, only charitable, nonprofit organizations will be funded by Cottonwood Foundation. Political and religious organizations, governmental agencies, for-profit businesses, private individuals, and universities are not eligible for funding by Cottonwood Foundation. Organizations that have received funding from Cottonwood Foundation in the past are eligible to apply for grants, but applications should not be submitted more than once every 12 months. Applications should be submitted in English if possible.

Currently, grant requests must be submitted by mail. Please follow these steps:

1. Print a copy of the Grant Application Form from the Cottonwood Foundation website
2. Fill it out (on paper), and attach any supporting documents
3. Mail to Cottonwood at the address noted at the top of the form

Cottonwood Foundation will accept grant applications at all times for consideration, with no formal deadlines for applications. Applicants can expect to receive notification within six months of receipt of their application about whether the application has been funded.

Application Information: Before a request is made for a grant or program-related investment, a brief letter of inquiry is advisable to determine whether the Foundation's present interests and funds permit consideration of the request.

The letter should include:

- The purpose of the project for which funds are being requested
- Problems and issues the proposed project will address
- Information about the organization conducting the project
- Estimated overall budget for the project
- Period of time for which funds are requested
- Qualifications of those who will be engaged in the project

After receiving the letter, Foundation staff members may ask the grant seeker to submit a formal proposal. There is no grant application form. The proposal should include:

- The organization's current budget
- A description of the proposed work and how it will be conducted
- The names and curriculum vitae of those engaged in the project
- A detailed project budget
- Present means of support and status of applications made to other funding sources
- Legal and tax status

In some instances, the Foundation requires the grantee organization to match the Foundation's grant with funds from other sources.

The Foundation supports pluralism and equal opportunity in its grant making and internal policies. The opportunities that prospective grantee organizations provide for minorities and women are considered in evaluating proposals.

Applications are considered throughout the year. Normally applicants may expect to receive within six weeks an indication of whether their proposals are within the Foundation's program interests and budget limitations. Activities supported by grants and program-related investments must be charitable, educational, or scientific, as defined under the appropriate provisions of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code and Treasury Regulations. The Foundation monitors grants through regular financial and narrative reports submitted by the grantee.

A 10-member grant committee, made up of local leaders who have robust knowledge of the African American community, evaluates the proposals and makes the award decisions.

The goal of the Fund for Omaha (FFO) is to improve the quality of life in Greater Omaha by supporting needs not being met in the areas of civic, cultural, health, education and social service. Organizations applying for FFO Grants must be tax exempt as defined by IRS 501(c)(3) status. The Foundation, except under unusual circumstances, does not make grants for endowments, capital campaigns, deficit financing, annual fund drives or fund-raising activities. The Foundation gives less consideration to applications from tax supported institutions, individual churches or similar religious groups, veterans, labor groups, social clubs, or fraternal organizations. Will not consider applications from art agencies or organizations except those linked with youth. The grant request must have the approval of the governing board of the requesting organization.

The Endowment Funds of Southwest Iowa are nine counties that have chosen to affiliate with the Omaha Community Foundation in order to take advantage of its expertise and services. Annually, five percent of each county endowment fund's balance may be granted to charities within its County. Local charities can apply to the fund to receive grants that are determined by the local county Advisory Board.

The Fund for Omaha is the Omaha Community Foundation's largest competitive grant program. The Fund for Omaha is designed to help nonprofits address community needs and to support effective solutions. The Greatest Need Grants program has evolved as a means for the Omaha Community Foundation to be responsive to the most pressing needs of the nonprofits in our community. Applicants are invited to identify their organization's greatest need and propose a plan to address it. Greatest Need Grants will fall into three broad areas and applicants must choose **one** area under which to submit a proposal:

· **Capacity building.** The Omaha Community Foundation focuses on nonprofit capacity building as a way to strengthen nonprofits and our community as a whole. Nonprofit capacity building is the improvement of capabilities, knowledge or resources, so an agency can achieve its mission more effectively. Examples include:

- Organizational assessment and strategic planning
- Fund development
- Professional development and leadership training
- Board development

- Communications, including website design, branding, and community outreach
- **General operating expenses.** These are expenses related to the day-to-day operations of a nonprofit. Examples include:
 - Purchase of equipment not related to a specific program
 - Staff salaries not related to a specific program

 - Regular costs of staying in business, such as rent and utilities
- **Programs.** The Fund for Omaha will continue to make program grants through the Greatest Need Grants program. These grants are intended to support new or ongoing programs that respond to a demonstrated community need. The Futuro Latino Fund was established in 2009 to address emerging needs within the Omaha-area Latino community. Local leaders from the Latino community make up the grant committee, which evaluates the proposals and makes award decisions. Three area foundations provided the funds to start this initiative: the Sherwood Foundation, the William and Ruth Scott Family Foundation, and the Lozier Foundation.

Organizations with annual budgets of \$300,000, or less, with innovative programs, initiatives, services or other ideas that serve Latinos are eligible to apply. The grant committee is open to proposals of any amount, although anticipated grants will be \$10,000, or less. No multi-year grants will be considered.

The core areas in which the Futuro Latino Fund will provide grants are:

- Arts & Culture (for example, performance, visual arts, arts education, cultural programs)
- Community Development (for example, neighborhood groups, family programs)
- Youth leadership and development (for example, high school leaders programs)
- Services for senior citizens (for example, senior centers in the Latino community)
- Women's leadership development (for example, projects that support and promote Latinas' empowerment)
- Health and Wellness (for example, medical, dental, mental or behavioral health, nutrition, physical activities)
- Civic engagement (for example, programs connecting Latinos with government or business leaders, nonpartisan efforts to give Latinos opportunities for influence of policymaking, grassroots advocacy)
- Economic development (for example, entrepreneurship and microbusiness programs, employment)

The Youth in Philanthropy Initiative is a program designed to involve local youth leaders in philanthropy. Juniors and seniors in high schools from across the city serve as the grant committee for distributing funds established through Youth in Philanthropy.

Youth in Philanthropy is an endowed fund established through the Omaha Community Foundation from

the proceeds of the sale of 3-D eyeglasses at the 2000 Millennium Lights celebration on the Gene Leahy Mall. A number of additional Omaha Community Foundation donors who support youth driven philanthropy also contribute to this fund.

Youth Leadership Omaha Ambassadors define the focus of the grant, determine review criteria, and select grant recipients. These high school juniors and seniors have examined issues they believe are most important to the youth of our city, discussed what topics interest them, and researched those areas. This effort helped the committee select "Teens Go Green" as the focus for the 2010 grants.

Any nonprofit organization with a 501(c)(3) status located in the greater Omaha metropolitan area is eligible to apply. Programs should be designed for youth. Grant proposals must address innovative ways to motivate and educate teens to go green, which is defined as reducing, reusing and recycling. Examples of this may include creative ways to educate youth using social media and technology, school groups that implement recycling programs, or youth produced videos that challenge teens to reduce their use of plastic bottles.

Successful applications must include all of the following components:

Active involvement of young people in the design and implementation of the proposed program.

Programs should address youth in any grade K-12.

Use of community or school based programs. Partnerships are encouraged.

Provision of matching funds, with a 1:1 match preferred.

Sustainability of the program (as appropriate).

The Community Foundations of Southwest Iowa are nine counties that have chosen to affiliate with the Omaha Community Foundation (OCF) in order to take advantage of its expertise and services. Because of their affiliation with OCF, they now have all the tools available to run an effective public charitable foundation, without the administrative burdens.

Each fund was formed by a volunteer Advisory Board made up of local county residents. The Advisory Board guides the fund in each county with technical assistance and management support services being provided by the Omaha Community Foundation.

In 1997, the Southwest Iowa Foundation initiated an affiliate program with the Omaha Community Foundation for nine southwest Iowa counties.
